



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

BERWYN CITY COUNCIL
JUNE 9, 2009

1. The regular meeting of the Berwyn City Council was called to order by Mayor Lovero at 8:00 p.m. Upon the call of the roll, the following responded presented: Chapman, Boyajian, Paul, Skryd, Santoy, Polashek, Avila, Laureto.
2. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited and a moment of silence was observed for the deceased mother of Fire Engineer Metido, deceased Robert Cox, brother of Deputy Clerk, Linda DeGutis, deceased Chicago police officer Valadez and for the safety of our armed forces, police, firefighters, and paramedics.
3. The Open Forum portion of the meeting was announced. Sabina Krause, 6949 30th Place questioned Council and Mayor and voiced concerns on the position of Deputy Police Chief and also questioned Laptops for aldermen and voiced cost concerns over the Mayor's salary and the salary of the City Administrator. Thereafter, Mayor Lovero addressed all issues, Resident Barb Lot, 6700 W. 31st Street commented on properties owned by MacNeal Hospital on the 3300 block of Wesley which were possibly abandoned and had blight issues and presented photos to Council as evidence.
4. The minutes of the regular City Council and the Committee of the Whole meetings held on May 26, 2009 were submitted. Thereafter, Avila made a motion, seconded by Skryd, to concur and approve as submitted. The motion carried by a voice vote.
5. The Berwyn Development Corporation submitted a communication regarding the Projected Additional Costs for 3306 Grove Avenue, parking structure. After discussion, Chapman made a motion, seconded by Avila, to concur and approve for payment in an amount not to exceed \$70,000. The motion carried by the following roll call: Yeas: Chapman, Boyajian, Santoy, Polashek, Avila, Laureto. Nays: Paul, Skryd.

The motion carried by the following roll call: Yeas: Chapman, Boyajian, Skryd, Santoy, Polashek, Avila, Laureto. Nays: Paul. Thereafter, Clerk Pavlik issued the oath of office with congratulations.
 15. The Clerk submitted and ordinance regarding the Prevailing Wage entitled: **AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE PREVAILING WAGE STANDARDS FOR THE CITY OF BERWYN, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS** Thereafter, Chapman made a motion, seconded by Skryd, to concur, **adopt** the ordinance as presented, and to authorize the corporate authorities to affix their signatures thereto and to authorize the Clerk to publish same. The motion carried by a unanimous roll call vote.
 16. The Clerk submitted a communication requesting the approval of Closed Cow minutes of April 14, 2009 and May 26, 2009. Thereafter, Laureto made a motion, seconded by Avila, to defer the matter for 2 weeks. The motion carried by a voice vote.
 17. Alderman Skryd submitted a communication regarding 2600 Highland-Harvey South Side Alley requesting "No Thru Traffic and a "15 mph" sign for safety. Thereafter, Skryd made a motion, seconded by Chapman, to concur and refer the matter to the public works department to install same. The motion carried by a unanimous roll call vote.
 18. Alderman Skryd submitted a communication regarding Traffic Safety/One Way Streets. Thereafter, Skryd made a motion, seconded by Chapman, to refer the matter to the Parking & Traffic committee and to the Traffic Engineer. The motion carried by a voice vote.
 19. Alderman Skryd submitted a communication regarding Districts 98 and 100 School playgrounds. After discussion, Avila asked for the communication to be amended to include the District 201. Thereafter, Skryd made a motion, seconded by Chapman, to refer the matter to the Mayor and the Park Districts. The motion carried by a voice vote.



MINUTES
COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE
JUNE 9, 2009

1. The Committee of the Whole was called to order by Mayor Lovero at 6:05 p.m. Upon the call of the roll, the following responded present: Chapman, Boyajian, Paul, Skryd, Santoy, Laureto. Absent: Polashek, Avila.
2. Chapman made a motion, seconded by Skryd, to excuse Aldermen Polashek and Avila. The motion carried.
3. Montessori School, 6907 W. Roosevelt Road-The Mayor recognized Felicia Levy, owner and representative of the school who handed out a Power Point presentation, see attached, including materials previously provide by the Collector, stating that hours would be Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. with morning extended program, 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 a.m., a full day would be 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. with extended evening hours 3:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.
 - The Mayor questioned if the matter went through the Zoning Board of Appeals, answer, yes, and it was referred to the City Council.
 - The Mayor recognized Collector Debi Suchy, who stated that the Zoning Boards' decision was split and no recommendation was given because 4 yes votes were not granted, and the matter was referred to the Committee of the Whole on April 14, 2009.
 - The Mayor stated that some of the Zoning Board concerns were pickup and drop off procedures. Ms. Levy explained procedures and safeguards.
 - The Mayor questioned the number of students, answer, 25 and not all arriving at the same time with before and after Care drop off.
 - The Mayor questioned the number of parking spaces available if the funeral home has a funeral, answer, 9 spaces on Clinton will still be available.
 - The Aldermen questioned DCFS licensing, answer, application has been applied for.
 - The Mayor recognized property owner who asked if DCFS has done a location inspection, answer, yes, and are awaiting final approval from DCFS.
 - The Mayor questioned Alderman Laureto regarding the Zoning Boards' concern; she stated that their main concern was regarding the drop and pickup on Roosevelt Road.
 - The property owner then spoke of the need of the need of the Montessori School in Berwyn.Alderman Polashek present at 6:34 p.m.

The Mayor noted that the matter would be on the June 23, 2009 Council agenda.


4. Agenda item E-2-Parking Structure proposed Rates-The Mayor recognized Sara Bratcher of the Berwyn Development Corporation who explained the two page memo regarding parking rates and explained \$.25 per hour rate with a \$3.00 maximum for 78 spaces and overnight would be a \$2.00 maximum, stating all 378 spaces are open and available on weekends; 300 spaces Monday through Friday are reserved for Metra Commuter parking at the Metra approved rates, see attached handout from Nichole Campbell, Traffic Engineer regarding Metra rates. The Berwyn Development Corporation is looking for approval and referral to the Law department or drafting of an ordinance.
5. Agenda Item E-1-Projected Additional Project cost for 3306 Grove Avenue, Parking Garage. Sara Bratcher of the BDC stated that this is regarding 5 windows on adjacent doctors' office building, which needed to be removed, bricked up, weatherized, and for lockable gates between the 2 buildings, with a maximum cost of \$70,000 out of the construction budget, which she stated is 1.2 million under budget at this time.
Alderman Avila present at 6:55 p.m.
Questions were raised from the aldermen regarding cost and security needs and possibly having security cameras. Ms. Bratcher explained that the infrastructure and wiring has already been installed throughout the parking garage and that security cameras would be an additional cost between the buildings at this time. Ms. Bratcher stated because of the time frame of the construction, the matter needed to be attended as soon as possible to avoid further cost and complications during a later construction phase. Alderman Chapman would like an approval for up to the dollar amount, but requested an engineer's pricing analysis.
6. Art-Space-Feasibility report, see attached. Ms. Bratcher explained, as informational for the new Council, that the BDC created a data base for over 11,000 artists. Art-Space completed a survey with 190 responses of interest with the results for need of 37 living/working units and 26 living/studio spaces.
7. Agenda items E-3 through E-7-The Mayor recognized Anthony Griffin of the Berwyn Development Corporation who presented the plans for E-3, Oak Park Depot landscaping and is asking for approval for up to \$25,000.
8. Agenda item E-4-Signage for Cermak Road, "Welcome to Berwyn" sign, see attached layout. Mr. Griffin stated that he is looking for approval of the

sign concept and cost approval with possible lattice change, per Main Street request.

9. Agenda item E-5-Additional funding on extended Commercial Loan for Garv's Inn-Griffin explained same, stating that this is only a supplemental loan fund request.
10. Agenda item E-6-Brando's Inc., 6838 Windsor-Griffin stated that the over run on budget is due to bring the building up to code and explained the elevator request, stating that the basement will not be using the amount of square footage needed to require an elevator, but they are still looking for supplement funds in the amount not to exceed \$16,000.
11. Agenda item E-7-Supplemental funding for LaNotte Café, 6822-24 Windsor Avenue-Griffin stated that an additional construction request was submitted after the original request and is looking and recommending an approval for up to \$5,000.
12. There being no further business to come before the meeting, same was, after a motion by Boyajian, and seconded by Avila, to adjourn the Committee of the Whole at the hour of 7:24 p.m. The motion carried by a voice vote.


The Berwyn Development Corporation's (BDC) Board of Directors and the Ogden/Depot TIF committee have both agreed to recommend approval of the below specified TIF monies regarding South Berwyn School District's project costs.

TIF assistance will be applied to renovation work at the Lavergne Education Center. Total costs for the project are estimated at \$217,570. The TIF scope of work includes, but not limited to 1) an energy efficiency upgrade to replace deteriorated windows and doors and 2) the installation of technology infrastructure.

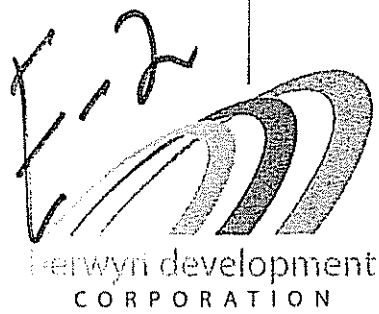
The BDC Board of Directors recommends the City Council approve TIF monies to pay only the eligible costs associated with this project up to a maximum of \$217,570. As part of our process, BDC staff will validate work performed and eligibility prior to any payments. The BDC will also ensure the applicant will not receive any TIF monies prior to obtaining City permits.

With the consent of City Council, South Berwyn School District 100 can commence work on his project and contribute to the revitalization efforts taking place Ogden Ave.

Messrs: Fejt, Castaldo, Persin, and Mrs. Laureto & Hernandez. Mr. Chrastka and Miller were absent.

WHEREAS, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the BERWYN ZONING BOARD OF APPEALS, (the "BOARD"), in a PUBLIC MEETING of the BOARD on the 17th day of March, in the year 2009, having considered all the facts presented at the Hearing of this matter;

WHEREAS, the APPLICANT has been duly informed that: (a) if the BOARD fully or partially approves the request of the APPLICANT and the CITY COUNCIL concurs in such decision; or (b) if the CITY COUNCIL fully or partially approves the request even though the BOARD has rejected the request of the APPLICANT or if the BOARD has made no recommendation to the CITY COUNCIL; the APPLICANT must obtain a building permit within SIX (6) MONTHS after the date that the ORDINANCE is enacted;

The BOARD has reached its decision after considering the testimony of the witnesses and the documents presented both prior to and during the Hearing, briefly set forth as follows:

1. Mr. Wesley Cichosz, the Real Estate owner residing at 231 Wesley Avenue, Oak Park, Illinois, and Ms Felicia Levy, the applicant residing at 201 S. Maple Avenue #104, Oak Park, Illinois, both testified. Mr. Cichosz testified as to the Real Estate and Ms Levy testified as to the operation of the proposed Day/Care Montessori School for pre-school children.

2. This Real Estate has the status of a Legal Non-Conforming Use improved with two connected buildings and the lot measures 25 feet wide from east to west and 125 feet in length from north to south. The front two story brick building that faces Roosevelt Road is 54.30 feet in length and the second attached brick one story building to the south measures 65.05 feet in length, a total of 119.35 feet in length for both buildings. The building has no set back off Roosevelt Road; a rear yard of 5.65 feet; side yard to the east of 3.58' for about 88.20 feet and then extends to the east lot line the rest of the way to the front north lot line; the rear building is just a fraction off the West lot line; and the front building is right on the west lot line.

3. The front building was leased to Musicopia, a music store, until August of 2008 when that tenant left the premises. The rear building is actually a garage and is being used by the owner for storage and there is room to park one car with entry through a double door at the south end of the building and there is another regular door next to the double door and both can be used to exit the rear building. There is a connecting door between the two buildings that can give access to the rear doors by those occupying the front building.

4. There is a basement in the front building and retail space on the first floor. The second floor has a 3 bedroom apartment which is occupied by a tenant. The rear garage building has no basement.

5. If the requested Conditional Use is allowed, the applicant shall sign a two year lease to occupy the first floor of the front building, with options to renew. This will be a sole proprietor business, doing business as Lecture Montessori School. Ms Levy testified that she has a bachelor's degree in children's education and is now taking the final test for a masters degree from Concordia University in River Forest, Illinois. She previously worked in Home Day/Care, but this will be her first business venture in this area. She will need to qualify for a

license from the Department of Childrens Family Services (DCFS), and she is certain that she will meet all the standards and will qualify for the license.

6. The hours of operation will be from 7:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M. Monday through Friday. Parents will park their cars on Roosevelt Road and Kenilworth Avenue, and walk their children to the front door for Safety and will also pick them up the same way at the end of the day. Hours of the children will be staggered so that not all will arrive at the same time.

7. The leased area will be sectioned off by book shelves in various places and five small existing offices with doors will remain along with a small kitchen and bathroom. They will have a catered lunch delivered to the premises and they will then merely deliver to the children. The children will have choices as to what specific programs they are interested in and the Montessori system of teaching and content will be available to all children, and she and her staff are or will be trained in that system. When the weather is good, the children will be walked over to Unity Park for recreation, which is located near the school. Most of the programs they have will be compatible to all children without having to separate them by ages. The program will qualify for an official Kindergarten certificate acceptable by any public or private school.

8. She will be one of the teachers and she will hire one other qualified teacher and one assistant for each teacher. The other teacher will also speak the Spanish language. There will be a monthly fee in the area of around \$850.00, which includes lunch, and most of their children will come from Berwyn, Oak Park and River Forest. They will also seek subsidies for children that need financial help, but that will not in any way restrict or interfere with their planned programs. There will be no medical person on the staff but they will work out an emergency call system with the local hospital and perhaps a private medical office in the area.

9. The front picture windows will remain and there is a small elevated area next to the windows that can be used as a reading room. They will strictly enforce the drop off and pick up procedures for safety of the children.

10. Mr. Robert Fejt, the area investigator, submitted a written report which is incorporated reference in this resolution. He did his investigation on Monday, March 9th, 2009 in presence of Felicia Levy. The size of the buildings is 119 feet by 25 feet. There is a half basement in which the heating unit is located. There is an apartment on the second floor of the front building with an entrance to the apartment at the west front of the building and an exit at the rear east side. There is a double door 6 feet wide connecting the front and rear building. The first floor where Mrs. Levy would like to have her business now consists of a large open area about 1,000 square feet , with three small rooms on the west side rear and a bathroom and storage room and furnace and hot water tank in a closet on the east side of the rear of the room, a bathroom and storage and furnace and hot water tank in a closet on the east side of the rear of the room.

Mrs. Levy would like to add another bathroom on the first floor and a kitchen area for food preparation, cabinets and a counter sink would be added to one of the existing rooms on the east side. The larger open area of the room will consist of both a teaching, play area, and desks for the children. Mrs. Levy has a degree in Montessori education and her business will consist of herself and three employees when fully in operation. Parking for employees and herself will be on Roosevelt Road and Kenilworth Avenue and along Clinton Avenue which is a dead end cul-de-sac. Drop off area for students will be on Kenilworth Avenue and parents will walk the students down three store fronts to the school. The block area now consists of a funeral home and flower shop to the east and two small fast food stores and a hair salon, construction office and the American Legion Post on the far west corner. Mr. Fejt voted in favor of granting the Conditional Use to operate a Children's Day/Care Montessori School as described.


11. Mrs. Hernandez, Mrs. Laureto, and Mr. Castaldo all voted against granting the requested Conditional Use, and Mr. Persin agreed with the area investigator and voted in favor of granting the requested Conditional Use. Comments of those against included concerns that the heavy traffic in the area will present a danger to the children, and that a tax based commercial business would be preferable in that area. Those in favor stated that the world renown Montessori education being offered will be a great asset to the children and the applicant will have a good safety plan for the parents to follow. The final vote was three votes against and two votes in Favor of granting the requested Conditional-Use to operate a Children's Day/Care Montessori School in accordance with the testimony at the hearing, documents

presented and the content of this resolution.

The Zoning Board of Appeals rules require no less than four votes either against or in favor of any matter before the Board to be considered as a recommendation of the Board, and since four votes were not cast either against or in favor of granting the requested Conditional Use, the Board is sending this resolution to the City Council without any specific recommendation either way. An ordinance is also enclosed in the event that the City Council should decide to grant the requested Conditional Use.

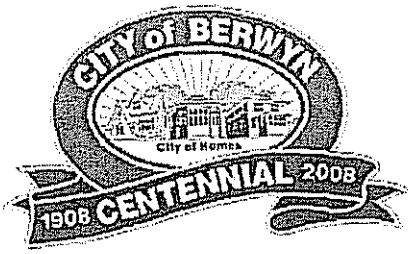

ORDINANCE _____

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE BERWYN CITY CODE TO ADD AND RECOGNIZE THE APPOINTED POSITION OF DEPUTY POLICE CHIEF IN THE CITY OF BERWYN, COOK COUNTY, ILLINOIS

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY the Mayor and City Council of the City of Berwyn, Cook County, Illinois, in the exercise of Berwyn's home rule powers as follows:

SECTION 1:

Section 242.03, Chapter 242, Appointed Officers; Appointment Procedure is hereby amended to read as follows; (with proposed additions underlined and proposed deletions ~~stricken~~):

242.03 APPOINTED OFFICERS: APPOINTMENT PROCEDURE.

(a) With the exception of the officers listed in Section 242.01, all City officers shall be appointed by the Mayor, by and with the consent of Council. Whenever a vacancy occurs in any office provided for in subsection (b) hereof, the Mayor shall present to Council, within thirty days of the occurrence creating such vacancy, the name of the appointee to such office, or shall, within such thirty days, inform Council of a temporary appointment, if such is the case. No person may be appointed to or temporarily hold any office provided for in subsection (b) hereof unless and until such person:

- (1) Has earned a high school diploma or the equivalent;
- (2) Is not in arrears in the payment of any tax or other indebtedness due to the City; and
- (3) Is not indicted for nor has been convicted of, in any court located in the United States, and still serving sentence for any infamous crime, bribery, perjury, or other felony involving the characteristics of dishonesty, falsehood or fraud.

Subsection (a) (1) shall not apply to a person who is being appointed to an office which he or she held with the City prior to January 1, 2004.

(b) Appointed City Officers shall include the following:

SECTION 2

If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity thereof shall not affect any of the other provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 3

All ordinances conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict

SECTION 4

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on or after its passage, approval and publication as provided by law.

Pension crisis is here to stay

VALLEJO, Calif.—Mayor Osby Davis, who has lived in this waterfront city across San Pablo Bay from San Francisco for 60 of his 62 years, says: “If you have a can that’s leaking 2 ounces a minute and you put an ounce a minute in it, it’s going to get empty.” He is describing his city’s coffers.

Joseph Tanner, who became city manager after this municipality of 120,000 souls was mismanaged to the brink of bankruptcy, stands at a whiteboard to explain the simple arithmetic that has pushed Vallejo over the brink. Its crisis—a cash flow insufficient to cover contractual obligations—came about because (to use fiscal 2007 figures) each of the 100 firefighters paid \$230 a month in union dues and each of the 140 police officers paid \$254 a month, giving their unions enormous sums to purchase a compliant city council.

So a police captain receives \$306,000 a year in pay and benefits, a lieutenant receives \$247,644 and the average for firefighters—21 of them earn more than

NYC Subways, Bankrupted San Diego, and Loom as the Next Financial Crisis.”

Next? This crisis has arrived in Jefferson County, Ala., which includes Birmingham. Like Orange County, Calif., a few years ago, Jefferson County made risky investments in a desperate attempt to achieve asset growth commensurate with the cost of an infrastructure project. When San Diego was earning the sobri-

firefighters can store up unused vacation and leave time over their careers and walk away, as one of the more than 20 who recently retired did, with a \$370,000 check. Last year, 292 city employees made more than \$100,000. And after just five years, all police and firefighters are guaranteed lifetime health benefits.

Even the City Council has at last faced facts and voted 7-0 for bankruptcy. "The day after they voted," Davis says, "I didn't go out of the house—I was that embarrassed."

In other states, municipalities can pay for improvident labor contracts by increasing property taxes. But Vallejo's promises were made in the context of Proposition 13, which 30 years ago wisely restricted California politicians' reach for property taxes. In 1996 the Navy base in Vallejo closed, which probably pleased some local liberals who share the anti-military mentality of San Francisco, to which some Vallejo residents commute by ferry. Liberals who, Tanner says dryly, "want Vallejo to look a certain way" were pleased when Wal-Mart moved to an adjacent town, which now reaps the sales-tax revenue.

Vallejo is an ominous portent for other cities, and some states, few of which are accumulating financial resources sufficient to fulfill pension promises they have made to employees. Are you weary of the crisis du jour—subprime mortgages and all that? Get a head start on worrying about the next debacle by reading Roger Lowenstein's new book, "While America Aged: How Pension Debts Ruined General Motors, Stopped the

with 90 percent of their pensions—almost full pay for not working during half of their expected adult lives.

Credit Suisse estimates that state and local governments have a cumulative \$1.5 trillion shortfall in commitments for retiree health care. But it is the pension crisis that most dramatically illustrates Lowenstein's thesis about the slow accretion of power by the unions. Pensions "are a perfect vehicle for procrastination; in the financial world, they are the most long-enduring promises that exist." Human nature—the propensity to delay the unpleasant—rears its ugly head: When pension benefits come due, the people who promised them, thereby buying labor peace and winning elections, are long gone.

Vallejo's unions contend that the city is solvent enough to meet its obligations. But last week a court disagreed, holding that the city is eligible for bankruptcy protection. A lawyer for Vallejo says the unions will have to negotiate a "plan of adjustment." Other cities are watching, perhaps including the one across the bay. San Francisco recently reported that 184 of its employees made at least \$30,000 apiece in overtime in the first half of this year. A nurse at the county jail made \$128,000 in overtime, putting him on track to top his total 2007 compensation of about \$350,000. Nice work if you can get it, and you can get it in many places.

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Vallejo, California, Plans to File for Bankruptcy (Update 3)
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By Michael B. Marois



May 7 (Bloomberg) -- Vallejo, California, officials voted to file for bankruptcy because the San Francisco suburb isn't able pay its bills after costs for police and firefighters soared and the housing market's slide cut into tax revenue.

The city council's unanimous decision last night will make Vallejo the largest California city to file for bankruptcy and the

first in the state to seek protection from creditors because it ran out of money to pay for basic services. The decision came after it failed to win salary concessions from labor unions.

The city of 117,000 is facing ballooning labor costs and declining housing-related tax revenue that have left it with a \$16 million deficit forecast for the year starting in July. In bankruptcy, creditors will be kept at bay while officials devise a plan to balance the books. City services would still operate.

"Nobody wants bankruptcy, but there doesn't appear to be a whole lot of options left," said city councilwoman Joanne Schivley. "We are going to be out of money by June 30. It's all a numbers game now."

Cities and towns rarely go bankrupt. Since 1937 there have been 543 municipal bankruptcies, two-thirds of which were small tax districts established to sell municipal bonds for projects, according to James Spiotto, a municipal bankruptcy specialist at Chapman and Cutler LLP in Chicago.

The last California city to file was Desert Hot Springs, a town of 20,000 north of Palm Springs that was hit with a legal judgment it couldn't afford. Orange County filed in 1994 amid bad bets on derivatives.

Cost Squeeze

Vallejo's plight stems from rising pay for police and firefighters under current labor contracts, including minimum staffing requirements, which have caused overtime compensation to increase. The problems were compounded by plunging home values, declining retail sales, and a slowdown in new housing development that cut \$5 million from the city's revenue projections between June and February. The closure of the local Wal-Mart store also pinched the city's sales tax receipts.

Police and firefighting salaries, pension and overtime consume almost 80 percent of Vallejo's \$89 million general fund budget. Cities in California on

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average spend about 60 percent of their budgets on firefighter and police salaries, according to the League of California Cities.

City and labor union officials have been meeting since January to revise the existing contracts. The unions have balked at pay cuts. By filing for bankruptcy, Vallejo is asking a judge to step in and force salary concessions from the labor unions.

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Judge's Decision

Once Vallejo files its petition, a federal bankruptcy judge must decide whether the city is actually insolvent. If so, the case can proceed. If the judge rules Vallejo isn't legally broke, the case would be dismissed, said the city's bankruptcy attorney Marc Levinson of Orrick, Herrington & Sutcliffe.

The fiscal strains afflicting Vallejo are reverberating across the U.S., as a housing slump and slowing economy curb revenue for states and local governments. Even so, no other California city, including those bordering Vallejo, has been pushed into insolvency because their revenue wasn't enough to pay day-to-day expenses.

Vallejo may be a unique case, given that no municipalities in areas such as Riverside County that have been hardest hit by the housing market rout are known to be considering bankruptcy, said Standard & Poor's analyst David Hitchcock.

Anger

Some residents are angry at city officials.

"It's a sad day when the officials we elected to lead this city just throw up their hands," resident Kenneth Shoemaker told the board prior to the vote.

U.S. state sales-tax collections fell in the first quarter for the first time in six years, according to a study by the Nelson A. Rockefeller Institute of Government in Albany, New York.

California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger's office predicted the state's budget deficit may reach \$20 billion, more than twice the size of previous estimates and enough to account for nearly one-fifth of the budget. States overall expect to have at least \$26 billion less than they need to pay bills in the next budget year, according to an April report by the National Conference of State Legislatures.

S&P today lowered the ratings on Vallejo's certificates of participation, a type of bond backed by its share of the state's vehicle license fees, to B from A, given the uncertainty of how the revenue source would be dealt with under bankruptcy, the rating company said in a statement. It also lowered the rating on Vallejo Public Financing Authority's bonds to B from A-

'Difficult Day'

Orange County in Southern California filed the biggest municipal bankruptcy in U.S. history in December 1994 after former Treasurer Robert Citron's wrong-way bet on interest-rate derivatives lost \$1.6 billion. The county of 3 million people is the third-most populous in California after Los Angeles and San Diego Counties.

"It's a sad and difficult day in Vallejo," said Orange County Treasurer Chriss Street. "Now, it's time to stop the blame game and time to start the management game. People need to start understanding that there's a pot of money and it can only go so far. The city is going to need learn to live with different expectations."

Vallejo, on the San Francisco Bay, was home to the West Coast's first shipyard, and residents say its economy never recovered after it was shuttered in 1996 as the U.S. military closed facilities after the end of the Cold War.

Hard Hit

The area has since been one of the hardest hit in Northern California by the housing market slump. Home prices in Solano County, where the town resides,

dropped 19 percent in January from the year before, according to DataQuick Information Systems, a firm which tracks real-estate markets in the state.

There are currently 1,214 "real estate owned" homes in Vallejo, meaning that the homeowners have been foreclosed and their lenders now own the houses, according to Irvine, California-based RealtyTrac, which sells data on foreclosures. Another 1,014 properties are in the foreclosure process, and 464 houses are scheduled to be auctioned.

Vallejo's Fiscal Freefall

Are other cities with budget trouble on the verge of asking the courts for relief?

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When the town of Vallejo, California, declared bankruptcy this spring, Mayor Osby Davis predicted — and rightly so — that he'd get an earful from his constituents, employees and retirees. What he didn't anticipate was the chorus of phone calls from mayors outside the city, both close by and clear across the country. They told him they were watching Vallejo's bankruptcy proceedings closely, and some of them, he says, indicated that "they find themselves not too far behind us."

Vallejo, a city of 120,000 about 35 miles northeast of San Francisco, flat-out went broke this year through a combination of generous public-safety salaries, declining property values and fiscal mismanagement. The city is estimating a \$17 million deficit for the current fiscal year.

Previous municipal bankruptcies generally arose from adverse legal rulings or poor investment decisions. But Vallejo's predicament stems largely from economic conditions felt by cities across the nation, namely declining revenues and rising employee costs. And that scares the dickens out of cities, unions and municipal bondholders.

"Vallejo was sort of the canary in the coal mine — the sickest patient goes first," says Dean Gloster, an attorney representing Vallejo's unions. "Even better-run cities are going to be facing similar issues as health care costs rise and the baby boomer generation reaches retirement age."

A September report from the National League of Cities points to precarious fiscal conditions in cities across the nation, due to falling revenues from property, sales and income taxes and rising costs from inflation, energy, infrastructure, salaries, health care and pensions. "Vallejo is significant in the sense that the reasons they are doing it are factors that are going to be in place in cities across the country," says Chris Hoene, director of policy and research for the National League of Cities. "You can see the Vallejo situation as something that cities across the country watch as a way to bring costs under control."

Uncommon Ground

Historically, use of Chapter 9 — the bankruptcy code for municipalities to reorganize their debts — has been quite rare. Since 1937, there have been a total of 564 municipal bankruptcies — fewer than 200 of which have occurred since 1980, and most of which have involved governmental units such as utilities or hospitals. Currently, Jefferson County, Alabama, is wrestling with the bankruptcy issue, but its fiscal problems hinge on an issue unrelated to a structural deficit — the bonds issued to pay for a new sewer system.

A declaration of bankruptcy is a loaded decision. "It's the third rail of municipal finance," says Chicago-based bankruptcy attorney James Spiotto. "If you go into Chapter 9, people are very concerned about your ability to repay and whether it will be habit forming."

Not all troubled jurisdictions can declare bankruptcy. Municipal bankruptcies are illegal in one state, Georgia; untested in several, such as Iowa and Maryland; and unlikely in others, such as New York and Pennsylvania, that have their own procedures on the books for rescuing distressed localities.

The fear that Vallejo's decision will set off a string of similar declarations may not be warranted. When the city of Bridgeport, Connecticut, declared bankruptcy in 1991, experts warned of a possible flood of other bankruptcies due to poor economic conditions and fiscal crises affecting cities nationwide. Bridgeport's bankruptcy was later withdrawn, however, and feared bankruptcies in other cities never materialized.

In large part, this is because of strict eligibility rules under Chapter 9 — and harsh consequences for cities that do declare bankruptcy. A city's bond rating plunges, making it difficult to borrow money. In the face of fiscal instability, residents and employees tend to vote with their feet. Bridgeport's population declined by more than 10,000 after it declared bankruptcy. In the past year, Vallejo has lost at least 25 of its 150 police officers, many of them younger officers.

"It's not an easy way out, nor did this council take it as an easy way out," says Vallejo's Mayor Davis. "Bankruptcy is not a victory."

Troubled Waters

Reasonable people can — and do — disagree about how Vallejo found itself in bankruptcy. There's no doubt, however, that many of the city's problems stem from its inability to recover from the 1996 closure of the Mare Island Naval Shipyard, once the city's largest employer. The city also lost hundreds of thousands of dollars per year in sales tax revenue after the closure of a Wal-Mart.

But the largest share of the blame in Vallejo has centered on public-safety salaries and benefits, which make up about 75 percent of the city's general fund budget. Base pay for firefighters is more than \$80,000 per year and employees can retire

at age 50 with a pension equal to 90 percent of their salary. the result of a retroactive pension increase several years ago.

With the downturn in the housing market hammering revenues, Vallejo is asking the bankruptcy judge to void the collective-bargaining agreements that led to those salary and benefit arrangements. And the possibility of hard-fought union contracts going up in smoke has struck fear in the heart of labor groups.

The California Professional Firefighters union proclaims, "If allowed to stand, Vallejo's attack on its own employees would send shock waves throughout the labor movement." Gloster, the attorney representing Vallejo's firefighters and police officers, says, "It's very difficult to see how their politicians should actually do the hard work to balance their budgets if they can get a do-over with a simple bankruptcy filing." Vallejo's unions are contending in court that the city is not truly insolvent. The city rejected an offer from the unions for about \$10 million in concessions.

The Bully Pulpit

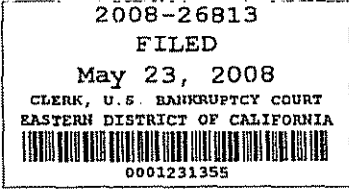
For Gloster, the question isn't whether Vallejo will have an effect on other cities but what ramifications other cities are already seeing. Specifically, he pointed to Vallejo's impact on ongoing labor negotiations. "What I hear from people in other cities is that it's already being played as a card," he says. "If you don't agree to these changes, we can do a Vallejo." That's what they call it.

The most effective method of dealing with looming fiscal problems in localities might be for states to shore up provisions for refinancing authorities or municipal assistance agencies — and perhaps build a framework to deal specifically with pension bailouts. Most analysts put state and local unfunded pension obligations in the hundreds of billions of dollars.

"While Vallejo may become the beginning of the trend," Spiotto says, "we ought to be looking at alternatives." Over the years, he points out, local leaders made spending decisions and assumed the next administration would be able to deal with it. "This has been a gift we've given to each generation, and sooner or later, we'll have to deal with it. It's becoming a growing reality that that sooner is coming now."

A "No Parking" or "No Parking Here to Corner" designation on the east side of South Ridgeland Avenue, just south of the intersection would help remediate this condition.

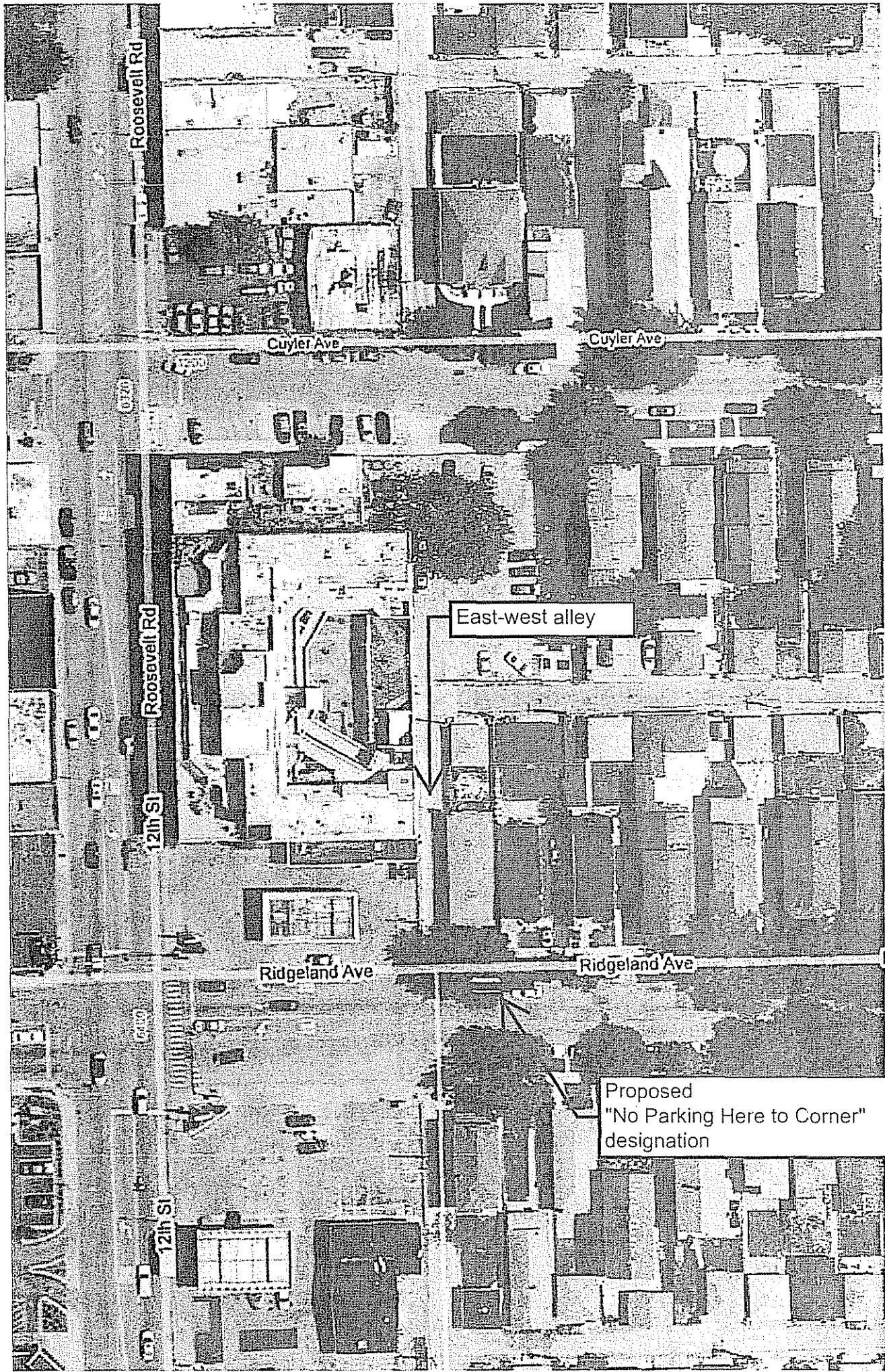

Re: Library Parking Lot and Surrounding Area

Library Parking Lot Current Conditions

Currently the east and west library parking lots do not have restrictions on the parking of commercial vehicles or parking restrictions in order to facilitate street sweeping and snow removal.

Library Parking Lot Recommendations

City ordinance states that commercial vehicles shall not park within the public right-of-way between the hours of 10:00pm and 6:00am, any day of the week. I recommend that the east and west parking lots also follow these restrictions.

I recommend that parking restrictions for Snow Removal in the library parking area take place from 2am-7am on an odd/even schedule. Therefore, parking is restricted from 2am to 7am on odd numbered days of the month, after 2 inches of snowfall, in the west library lot and from 2am to 7am on even numbered days of the month, after 2 inches of snowfall, in the east library lot in order to allow for snow removal by a private contractor.

I recommend that parking restrictions for Street sweeping in the library parking area take place from 2am-7am on Tuesdays and Wednesdays. Therefore, parking is restricted between 2am and 7am on Tuesdays in the west library lot and from 2am to 7am on Wednesdays in the east library lot in order to allow for sweeping by Public Works.

These "Library Parking Lot Regulations" can be posted on large signs located at the entrances and exits of the lots to inform motorists. See Exhibit A for possible locations designated by an "S". These regulations will also need to be incorporated into the City's Codified ordinances which have been prepared and are attached.

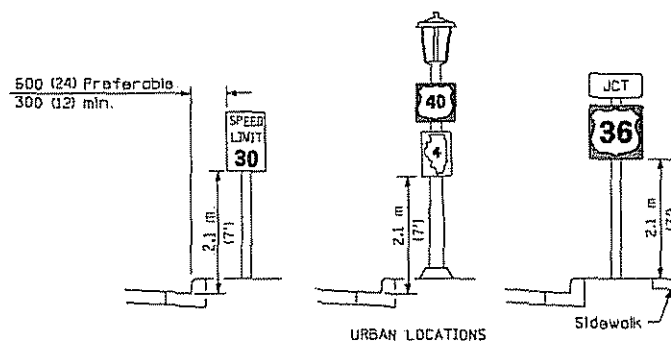
Library Surrounding Area

A summary of sign and striping updates were made for the pedestrian crossing at the library. The summary is attached and included is a detailed outline below and a map of the changes. The "No Parking" areas will need to be included in the codified ordinances as part of these changes. A "No Parking" ordinance has been prepared and is attached.

Please refer to Exhibit A for a map of the items listed below. All sign heights should be 7 feet from bottom of sign to top of pavement, see Exhibit B.

- A. Existing "No Parking Anytime" area.

- B. This area should be “No Parking Anytime” based on sight distance restrictions and the start of the left turn lane.
- C. Parking within 50 feet of the nearest rail of a railroad crossing is prohibited per the Illinois vehicle code, however vehicles have been observed parking in this area. “No Parking Anytime” signage should be added.
1. Lower the Pedestrian crossing sign below the street name signs. Add supplemental plaque that reads “200 FEET” below the pedestrian crossing sign. Relocate no left turn sign to existing pole located on the southeast corner of 27th Street and Riverside Drive. Remove the yellow railroad warning/fine sign. Add a “No Parking Anytime” sign.
 2. Check height of pedestrian crossing sign. Add a supplemental downward pointing arrow (left). Remove and relocate blue library sign.
 3. Remove slippery when wet sign. Install blue library sign. Remove no parking here to driveway sign, install “No Parking Anytime” sign.
 - The mixing of two different colors of warning signs is not a recommended practice (standard yellow versus florescent yellow-green). The accident reports for 2008 and 2009 (to date) were reviewed for wet weather accidents. In 2008, 14 accidents occurred along Riverside Drive, 2 of which occurred during wet weather conditions; and in 2009, 4 accidents occurred, 1 of which occurred during wet weather conditions. The police reports indicated that the contributing factor to these accidents was driving too fast for conditions, therefore I feel that the installation of a speed limit sign (item 4) would be more effective.
 4. Remove pedestrian crossing sign. Remove neighborhood watch sign. Install 25mph speed limit sign, check height of no parking sign.
 5. Remove slippery when wet sign and post.
 6. Install downward pointing arrow (left) under pedestrian crossing sign. Install florescent yellow-green reflective strip to sign pole.
 7. Install a “No Parking Anytime” sign on the lightpole.
 8. In-street pedestrian crossing sign on a crash-worthy base to be placed and removed by library personnel.

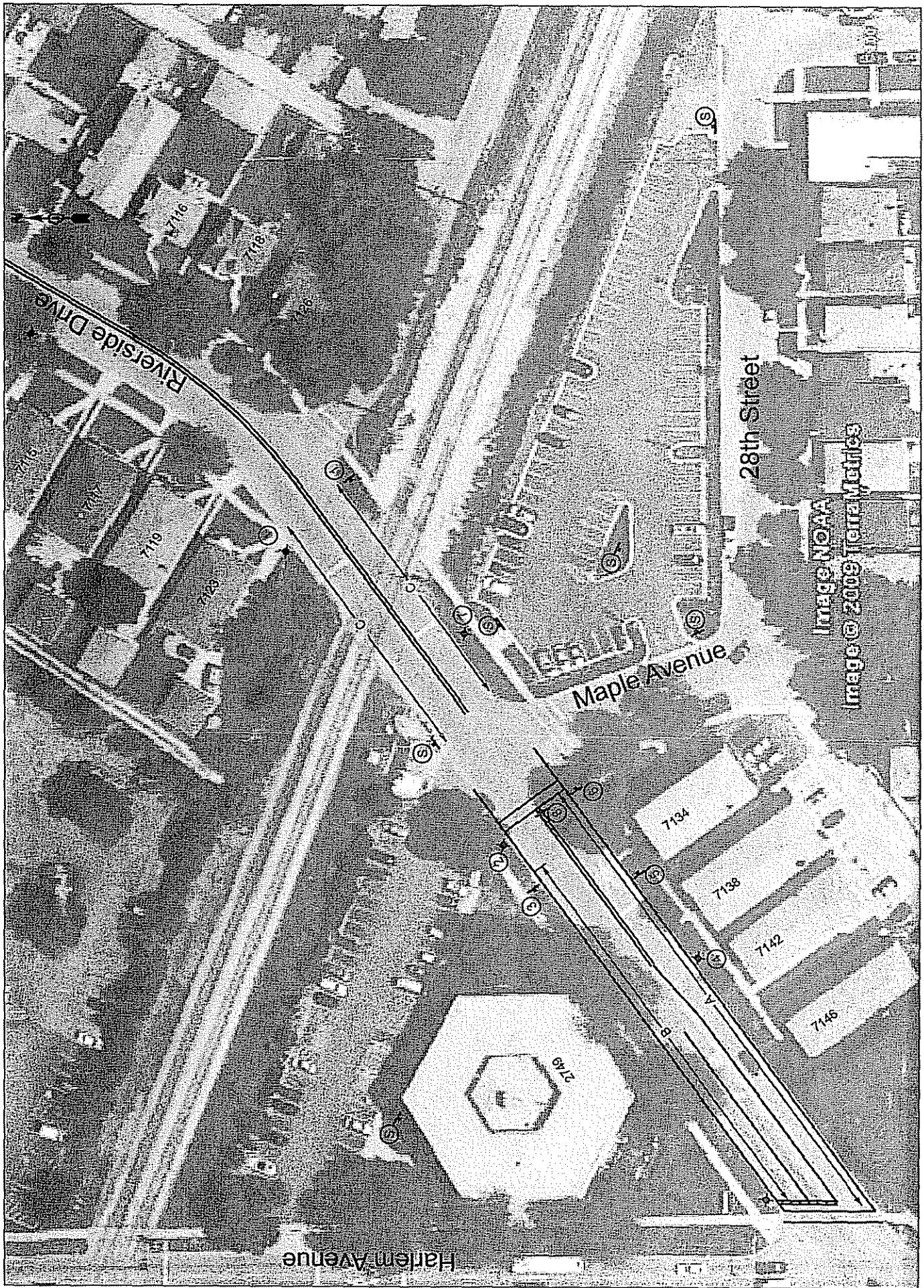

480.03 PARKING OF MOBILE HOMES, SNOW PLOWS AND OTHER HEAVY VEHICLES.

(a) Except as otherwise provided in this Traffic Code, no person shall park, in any street, alley or parkway in the City, any pickup camper (with a cap higher than six inches above the cab roof), van that exceeds the manufacturer's height, motor home, mobile home, boat or boat trailer, other trailer, tractor, bus, truck whose gross weight exceeds three-fourths of a ton or vehicle of the first or second division, as defined in the Illinois Vehicle Code, when such vehicle is equipped with an attached snow plow.

(b) No person owning, controlling, driving or operating a commercial vehicle shall cause or permit such vehicle to stand or be parked on the streets or in the alleys of the City for a period of time longer than is necessary for:

- (1) The reasonably expeditious loading or unloading of passengers;
- (2) The reasonably expeditious loading, unloading and delivery or pick-up of material; or
- (3) The reasonably expeditious completion of a requested service call or performance of a requested service.

(c) A permit may be granted, for a maximum stay of forty-eight hours, for one, unoccupied, mobile home or motor home per family to be parked on a residential street, provided that the permit for the stay is obtained by the owner thereof from the Police Department in advance of such parking. The permit shall be displayed in the front windshield of the mobile home or motor home and may be granted not more than twice in a twelve-month period. (Adopting Ordinance)

(d) As used in this section, "commercial vehicle" means a vehicle:

- (1) Having an Illinois license plate bearing one or more letters of the alphabet, except "RV" or "CV", preceded by a number;
- (2) Having a written advertisement on the vehicle indicating or promoting a business enterprise for hire;
- (3) Having ladder racks, ladders, brackets, tools or any other paraphernalia in plain view making it obvious that the vehicle is being used for a business enterprise; or
- (4) Registered to any legal entity, i.e. a sole proprietorship, a partnership or a corporation.

Commercial vehicles as described hereinabove shall not be parked upon any public way between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. of the following day, any day of the week.

(e) The following commercial vehicles are exempt from the provisions of this section:

- (1) All public utility vehicles used for emergency purposes parked for the necessary period of time to complete and restore all services; and
- (2) All rental trucks and moving vans parked overnight for one night with the approval and authorization of the Police Department.

Commercial vehicles as described hereinabove shall not be parked between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m. of the following day, any day of the week, in the following locations:

(1) East Library Parking Lot

(2) West Library Parking Lot

(Ord. 97-45. Passed 10-14-97.)

480.05 STREET CLEANING AND SNOW EMERGENCY PARKING RESTRICTIONS

(c) Commuter Parking/Vacin Fairway Parking/Library Parking Lot

(1) No person shall stop, stand, park or leave unattended any motor vehicle in the following parking lot areas under the following conditions:

A. Whenever there is a snow accumulation of six inches or more on the ground, at which time a snow emergency will have been declared and in effect;

B. Between 2:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m.; and

C. In the Stanley Avenue Commuter Parking Strip on odd numbered days of the month and in the Windsor Avenue Commuter Parking Strip on even numbered days of the month; and in the Vacin Fairway Parking Lot on the north side of the Lot on odd numbered days of the month and on the south side of the Lot on even numbered days of the month.

(2) No person shall stop, stand, park or leave unattended any motor vehicle in the following parking lot areas under the following conditions:

A. From April 1 through November 30, inclusive, between 2:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m.; and

B. In the Windsor Avenue Commuter Parking Strip on Tuesdays and in the Stanley Avenue Commuter Parking Lot on Wednesdays; and in the Vacin Fairway Parking Strip on the south side of the Strip on Tuesdays and on the north side of the Strip on Wednesdays.

(3) No person shall stop, stand, park or leave unattended any motor vehicle in the following parking lot areas under the following conditions:

A. Whenever there is a snow accumulation of two inches or more on the ground;

B. Between 2:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m.; and

C. In the West Library Parking Lot on odd numbered days of the month and in the East Library Parking Lot on even numbered days of the month.

(4) No person shall stop, stand, park or leave unattended any motor vehicle in the following parking lot areas under the following conditions:

A. Between 2:00 a.m. and 7:00 a.m.; and

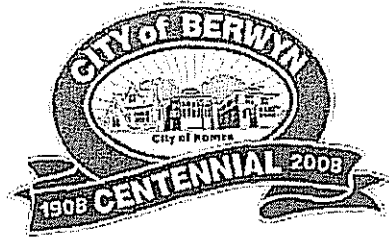
B. In the West Library Parking Lot on Tuesdays and in the East Library Parking Lot on Wednesdays.

480.08 PROHIBITED PARKING

In addition to the portions of the Illinois vehicle Code, adopted and listed under section 420.01 Portions Adopted, parking is prohibited at the times, days and locations as contained in this section.

- (a) Parking Prohibited at all times and days:
 - (1) North side of Riverside Drive from the Library Parking Lot west to Harlem Avenue.
 - (2) South side of Riverside Drive from Harlem Avenue to Maple Avenue.

Re: Pedestrian Crossing at the Library

Current Conditions

Southside of Riverside Drive, from Harlem to Maple Avenues, a pedestrian warning sign, a neighborhood watch sign and a no parking anytime sign are posted on a lightpole approximately 100 feet from the crossing. At the crossing a pedestrian warning sign is posted. This sign is not posted at the correct height. Supplemental plaques, as required by MUTCD standards, are not posted. Mixing of florescent yellow green signs and engineer grade signs (slippery when wet sign) is present at this location. Normally mixing of two different background colors and excessive use of warning signs is advised against. The current crosswalk consists of two 6-inch white lines across the pavement. See Attachment 1.

Northside of Riverside Drive, from 26th Street to Maple Avenue, a pedestrian warning sign is posted on a lightpole (with various other signs) north of the railroad tracks approximately 150 feet from the crossing. The pedestrian warning sign at this location is not posted at the correct height. At the crossing a pedestrian warning sign is posted on a lightpole with a blue library sign. The library sign overlaps a portion of the pedestrian warning sign. Supplemental plaques are not posted at these locations. See Attachment 1.

Recommendations

A sign priority at this location should be established. When too many signs are posted within one location motorists become overloaded with information and tend to disregard all signs posted.

Southside of Riverside Drive, from Harlem to Maple Avenues

The pedestrian warning sign at the crosswalk should be posted at the correct height with a downward pointing arrow supplemental plaque. A florescent yellow green (FYG) reflective strip can be added to the post for extra emphasis to the situation. Remove the Slippery When Wet warning sign. This sign is posted within the distance that motorists should be identifying, reacting and executing a maneuver in response to the pedestrian crossing sign. Removing this sign will prevent motorists from becoming overloaded with information. Remove the neighborhood watch sign from the lightpole and raise the No Parking Anytime sign to the correct height. Ensuring that the No Parking Anytime sign can be read and followed by motorists will improve the visibility of the pedestrian crossing and signs. An advanced warning sign for the pedestrian crossing should be posted a distance of 325 feet from the crossing based on the posted speed limit. Options are:

- (1) To remove the pedestrian warning sign from the lightpole. The pedestrian crossing sign at the cross walk can be seen from the intersection at Harlem Avenue. This will again reduce the number of signs in this location so that the motorists' attention is focused on the crossing. The use of a FYG reflective strip on the post will aid in this.
 - a) However, adding a speed limit sign may be helpful. This will remind motorists entering Harlem Avenue of the reduced speed from 30 mph to 25 mph and that conditions on Riverside Drive cannot handle the higher speed (wet pavement conditions are slippery).
- (2) Place the pedestrian warning sign on a separate post with a supplemental plaque stating "Ahead" or "X feet". Placing this sign on a separate post will direct the motorists' attention to that sign only. A FYG reflective strip will not be placed on this post.

Northside of Riverside Drive, from 26th Street to Maple Avenue

The lateral offset of the pedestrian crossing sign exceeds the preferable distance stated in the MUTCD and Statewide standards. Options are:

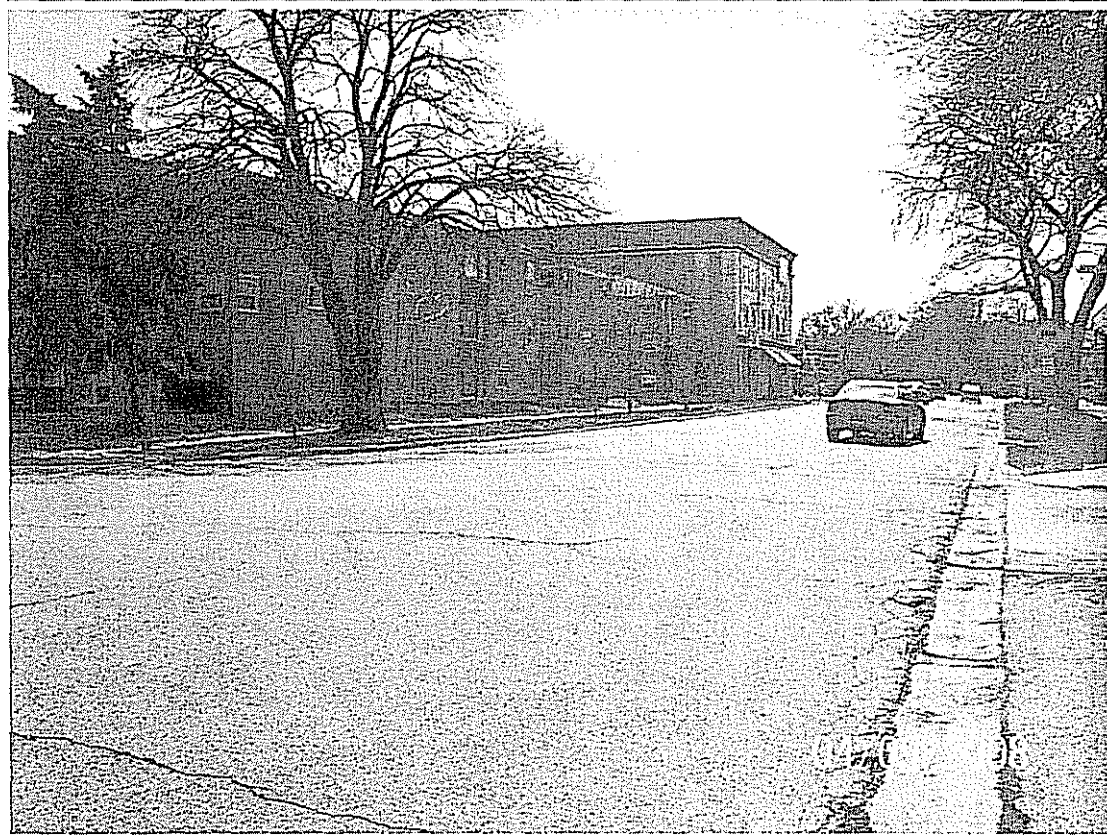
- (1) Post the pedestrian warning sign at the crosswalk at the correct height with a downward pointing arrow supplemental plaque on a separate post. A florescent yellow green (FYG) reflective strip can be added to the post for extra emphasis to the situation. The edge of the sign should be within 2 feet of the curb face. The blue library sign should not be posted with this sign. The blue library sign should not be posted in between the advanced warning sign and the pedestrian crossing.
- (2) Remove the blue library sign from the lightpole and add the downward point arrow plaque. Adjust the pedestrian crossing sign and supplemental plaque to the correct height.

The slippery when wet sign should be placed further from the pedestrian crossing sign or may be removed. The advanced warning sign for the pedestrian crossing should be placed on a separate post, at the correct height, with a supplement plaque, indicating the distance to the crossing. This sign should be posted north of the curve in the alignment.

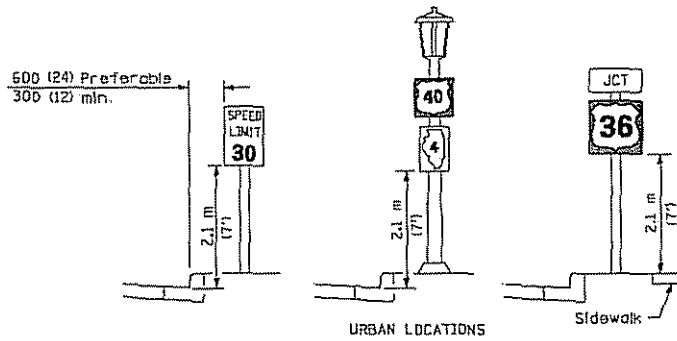
See Attachment 2 for proper sign installation.

The pedestrian crossing at the library is not at a stop sign and is similar to a mid-block crossing for vehicles traveling south-west on Riverside Drive. Therefore the crosswalk can be upgraded to a Type 2 or Type 3 crosswalk. See Attachment 3 for crosswalk details.

Proper sign installation should be established followed by upgraded pavement markings. After these items have been in effect, pedestrian counts can be performed and vehicle compliance to these upgrades can be observed in the field. If engineering judgment finds that these items are not producing the desired effects in regards to pedestrian safety, a warning beacon may be installed upon the pedestrian crossing sign.

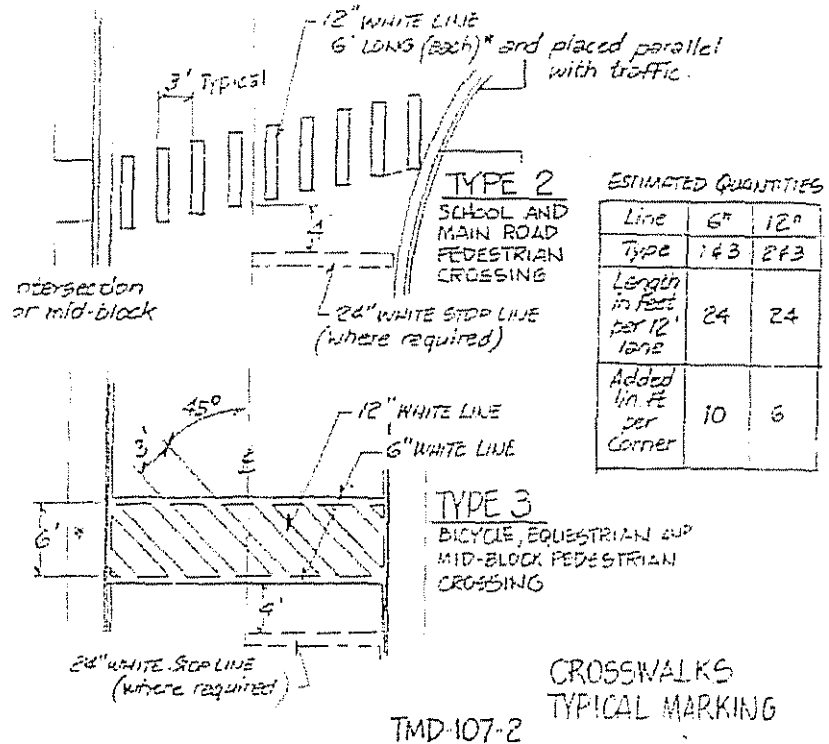



Our days of service near an end. Are you as happy as I? But to business....

We've had difficulty with residents parking commercial vehicles over-night in the new library parking lot east of Riverside Drive and in the 3rd ward. Several personal automobiles do so also but with the parking congestion in Berwyn that's of less concern.

Several commercial vehicles park there for extended periods and interfere with snow plowing, and last autumn, we were unable to find owners to move vehicles when the lot was seal-coated. There has been damage to the fence separating the Canadian National Railroad from the parking lot that we suspect was done by a large truck often using the lot. The police will not ticket as there is no signage restricting parking. Also there's a problem with teenagers using the site as a gathering place (more of a policing concern).

Could you please refer this matter to the law department for review of best language, and authorization, for parking control. We would like to limit commercial vehicle parking over-night. If it's necessary to prohibit all parking that would be acceptable. Any suggestions for better regulation would be helpful.



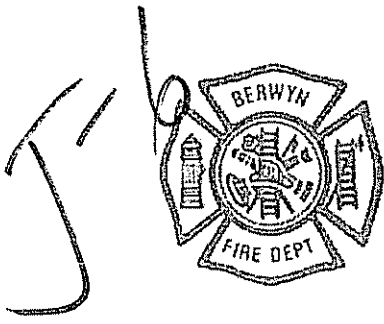
The North Berwyn Park District offers recreation and leisure service activities to the community; our partnership has improved the quality of life for our residents.

**RE: 2009 American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (A.R.R.A.) Assistance to Fire Firefighters Grant
For Fire Station Construction**

Non-Federal Fire Department and State and Local Governments that fund or operate Fire Departments can begin applying for part of the \$210 million in Fire Station Construction funding to build new Fire Stations. This grant is available under the Fire Station Construction (FSC) Grant Program. Application must be submitted and completed by 5:00 p.m. July 10, 2009. The purpose of the FSC program is to provide economic stimulus through job creation or preservation and improve the safety of the firefighters and the community they serve.

The City of Berwyn is able to apply for up to \$5 million for construction costs. With this Grant there is no cost sharing requirements as in the previous Assistance to firefighter grants applied for. There are some other requirements that this project be shovel ready. We can address the project ready requirement by using our 16th Street Fire Station plans. The City must own the property. I have proposed the old Police Station property as a location for this site. Wold Architects and Engineers (company used for the 16th street station) has assisted with providing a conceptual drawing on the lot and construction costs for the project for Grant purposes only. As you know if we are successful this could open up the space occupied by the Fire Department at City Hall to allow for future expansion and combination of City services. As you know we would have to go through the Bidding process if awarded the Grant.

Under direction of Mayor Lovero, Deputy Chief Richard Swade and I have begun the Grant Application. We have enlisted the help of some of our Citizen's Fire Academy volunteers who are professional writers to assist us in the application process. We will submit the application before the deadline and await the results. The Grants are scheduled to be awarded in September of 2009, with a
